

Introduction to the NIBP Team

Newquay in Bloom Partnership (NIBP) was formed in 2004 to bring on board the local authority, local businesses, public bodies and community-minded organisations. Prior to that the Newquay Floral Partnership had mainly organised an annual Gardens Competition for schools, residents and businesses culminating in an Awards Presentation Evening. Under the guidance of Kim Parish, the Partnership started to enter the town in the South West in Bloom Competition and in recent years has achieved much success resulting in entering Britain in Bloom, the national competition, and being awarded Gold in 2012 and Silver Gilt in 2017. Entering South West in Bloom led to the development of new projects to enhance the appearance of the town as well as more fundraising activities to finance them.

The team are all keen gardeners aiming to make the town a tidier, greener, more attractive and more environmentally friendly place to live and work as well as for tourists to visit. Currently the team actively maintain 14 project areas in regular gardening sessions on Sunday and Wednesday mornings in all weathers throughout the year. This involves keeping the beds weeded, trimmed, free of litter and well stocked with plants suitable for the conditions. Many plants are provided from members' own gardens which helps to keep costs down. In addition we plant up and maintain 4 sets of planters around the town with spring bulbs early in the year and bedding plants for summer display. This last year we have also responded to requests for help from the Friends of Newquay Hospital and the manager of Waterworld.

Organising the group's activities requires the committee to hold regular meetings on a monthly basis throughout the year.



Presenting the Parks Award to Rex Cook & Stuart Lutherburrow of Cormac in Trenance Gardens Following the setting up of the unitary authority in 2009, the town's assets passed to Cornwall Council and the maintenance of them to **Cormac**, the Council's contracting arm. Areas maintained by Cormac include Trenance Gardens and the Dinard Garden. They also cut the grass verges and grass on the Mellanyrane roundabout.

NIBP works with Lea Thomas, Community & Partnership Officer who has been very helpful supplying bulbs, seeds, plants and equipment for our volunteer groups. Phil Maund, Lead Environment Steward, arranged repairs to the fence at the Dinard Garden following Storm Darragh. Kelly Strange, Urban Ranger and her team have been responsible for the Urban Green Shoots planting project at the Barrowfields.

The Environment Team of Newquay Town Council under Manager, Joe Ashton, are responsible for the maintenance of various areas in town not maintained by Cormac including the Killacourt. The Team also maintain and water the hanging baskets at Chester Road and in the pedestrian precinct which are funded by NTC.

The Team are also developing a site at Trencreek for allotments and a community garden and collaborating with Newquay University on a 10 year Woodland Management Plan for Priory Woods which will eventually include wildlife interpretation boards and improved pathways. This year they have been deadhedging along the edge of the path.

After Christmas residents were encouraged to take their Christmas Trees to a car park collection point for recycling. The Team hired a shredder and NIB were given access to the mulch pile for use on project beds.

The Team regularly collect the green waste from NIB's gardening sessions and take it away for composting.

Newquay Heritage – Past and Future

The Bronze Age burial barrows on the Barrowfields are evidence that Newquay and surrounding area has been settled since earliest times. At the start of the 19th century Newquay was a small fishing village and the parish church was in St Columb Minor. The Huer watched for shoals of fish from the hut on the cliff and directed the fishermen to the catch. At this time large quantities of pilchards were landed, gutted and salted for export from the harbour. The railway, built to facilitate trade in minerals discovered and mined locally, led to the growth of tourism and the building of luxury hotels and facilities for visitors along with more housing for workers and tradespeople. Gig Racing evolved from the need to transport pilots out to ships to guide them into harbour and soon became established as a competitive sport and remains a popular sport with regular racing fixtures. Surfing became popular here in the 1960s and the town has since become a major surfing destination throughout the year. In August the town hosts the annual Boardmasters event combining world class surfing with a popular music festival. Currently many former hotel sites are being developed as luxury apartment complexes as demand for hotel accommodation has declined. Newquay **Neighbourhood Plan** aims to ensure that these are in keeping with surrounding buildings and respect the environment.

In the last couple of years much of central Newquay has been revitalised thanks to funding being secured for a number of major projects which have made a huge difference to the appearance and atmosphere of the town.

One of the first was the **Killacourt Enhancement** completed in 2021. This improved green space is now used for music events throughout the year and a monthly market and Food Festival in August. The start up shop units include Mushlove, a small eco friendly business selling all kinds of mushrooms and medicinal mushroom powders. There is also a free dolphin shaped refill point for water bottles.







Newquay Town Team made up of representatives of Newquay Town Council (NTC), Cornwall Council, BID, local businesses and residents identified further areas for improvement one of which is **Towan Beach Triangle**. Funding has allowed for vegetation to be cleared, planting to be supplemented in the beds and planters, seating to be replaced or renovated and improvements made to pathways at the Eothen and Beachfield Gardens, a busy area linking the town and the beach. See pictures below of work underway and completed.

Meanwhile through BID, **Experience Newquay** set up by Cornwall Council has offered grants of £2,500 for shop front enhancement and cultural experiences. 13 businesses have benefited including Newquay Activity Centre on Fore Street.

This year **Newquay BID** has funded colourful bunting through the town. Many new businesses have made an impact recently including the **Boathouse** at Newquay Harbour where a bar and numerous food stalls serving street food create a relaxed vibe. **Project 83** at Wesley Yard is developing as a café and venue for music and events stocking merchandise aimed at motorcycle enthusiasts







As part of the **Mid Cornwall Metro plan** to upgrade the railway link between Newquay and Falmouth, funded by the by the Government Levelling Up Fund, £4 million is being spent on much needed improvements to **Newquay Railway Station**. An extra platform has been built at the station and once the project is completed in March 2026 there will be additional through train services direct to Falmouth. A new public toilet block at the station has been installed funded jointly by NTC and Boardmasters and the Environment Team have added industrial style planters in front.



Newquay Orchard is a social enterprise running learning and social programmes ensuring more people have access to skills, training and opportunities and overcoming barriers such as poor mental health or adverse experiences. It comprises a growing space, market garden, community space and popular Heart and Soul Café.

In autumn 2024 Newquay library hosted the **Back Garden Forest** project to gave away 600 trees for residents to plant in their gardens. A further 600 will be given away in autumn 2025.

The Welcome Sign at Trevemper is to have a makeover now that a new design has been agreed. Two more will be placed in new positions on the approaches to the town near Nansledan. NIB will be involved in landscaping for these in collaboration with the Duchy of Cornwall.



Hendra Tourist Park is a multi-award winning park set in 80 acres of landscaped parkland. The owners actively strive to reduce the impact of the site on the environment by investing in renewable energy and ongoing rewilding projects. A variety of outdoor activities are on offer as well as swimming pools, restaurants and a coffee bar.



Nansledan



As in many places, in recent years there has been an increase in housebuilding in and around Newquay with new housing estates at Quintrell Downs, Lane and Trevemper, where a new road layout opened this year.

Nansledan (Cornish for Broad Valley) on the outskirts of Newquay is a large scale development of a whole new community by the Duchy of Cornwall. It comprises homes, a primary school, play areas, businesses, shops, cafes, restaurants, and health and leisure facilities. The project is designed to strengthen the bonds of community and place by giving people a sense of pride in where they live and work. Toward that end, in June the second Nansledan Arts Festival took place with craft and creative writing workshops, art, garden and scarecrow trails, music making and comedy. There is an active Community Association who recently organised a VE Day Party. Work is underway on a new Tesco megastore and in May the new road through the development was opened with a bridge crossing the railway line. This provides a new link between the east and west of Newquay easing traffic flow round the town. The British Legion centenary stone is in the area planted with native trees which forms part of the Queen's Green Canopy and the Forest for Cornwall (see photo below)

Art in the Landscape: MUQY Murals of Newquay

In 2021 **Newquay Walls Project** painted murals at Harbour Heights to celebrate the history of Newquay Harbour, one panel of which is shown here.



The MUQY Street Art Trail is an exciting new initiative produced by Slapdash Studio. A free walking trail around the town centre hosted on Love Newquay's website takes in the large murals celebrating the town's heritage and identity on themes like tourism, fishing and hospitality. Each one is by a different artist with their own distinct style. It was started by Experience Newquay and is funded by Cornwall Council's Town Delivery Fund. At present there are 5 murals and more are planned for the Railway Station and the WI Hall. The latest one at the Red Lion features surfing Fistral's Cribbar Wave and was sponsored by Boardmasters – see photos on Page 10.

Cups and certificates were also presented to the gardeners and businesses who entered NIB's Gardens Competition.















Environment

Biffa is responsible for alternate fortnightly doorstep refuse and recycling collections and weekly collections of food waste. Residents are encouraged to take larger items to the Trevenson Road facility for disposal. The council supplies brown bins for garden waste from households which is collected on a subscription basis.

There is now increased awareness of the need to reduce single use plastic in all its forms. One initiative, 'Plastic Free Newquay', encourages businesses to find alternatives to single use plastic items such as drinking straws and cups.

Surf Wood for Good supply wooden bellyboards for hire free. Newquay firm, **Oltco** use waste plastic in the resin surfacing material they use.

Newquay Beach Care and **Fistral Beach Clean** organise regular litter picks on Newquay's beaches.

The Blue litter project is collecting marine litter across Cornwall throughout the tourist season and collaborating with the marine leisure industry and volunteers. Clean Cornwall supply specialised equipment and findings will be logged to highlight hotspots and types of litter found.







Changing young lives through surf therapy



The Wave Project based in Fore Street, Newquay and in collaboration with Suez and Cornwall Council has set up a collection point at Trevenson Road Recycling facility for preloved wetsuits. Alternatively they can be taken to the shop. These are then either resold, repaired for reuse or shredded for recycling. All profits from the shop help to support surf therapy programmes to improve young people's mental health, confidence and well being.



Beryl Bikes have been introduced in Newquay and six other Cornish towns and the scheme has been expanded with additional collecting points this year. The system is operated by Beryl on behalf of Cornwall Council and funded by the Carbon Neutral Cornwall Fund. The e-bikes share scheme works by downloading a free app. E-bikes can be ridden anywhere but must be returned to one of the approved marked locations around the town as shown here at Chester Road. Newquay had the highest uptake of all the towns in Cornwall last year.

Councillor Sarah Thomson is collaborating with Joe Ashton of the Environment Team of NTC to apply for a Countryside **Stewardship Woodland Management Plan Grant** to improve access and educational opportunities for Priory Wood in St Columb Minor where a survey revealed the presence of both Lesser and Greater Horseshoe bats.

Swift bricks which have been incorporated into the new houses being built by the Duchy of Cornwall at Nansledan and Tregunnel have resulted in an increase in swift numbers locally. The annual survey last year showed that over half the bricks showed signs of occupation some by starlings, sparrows and house martins as well as swifts.

Waterhaul at Treloggan Industrial Estate recovers abandoned fishing gear from the ocean and recycles it into new durable and sustainable products such as sunglasses. The company was named overall winner at the Cornwall and Isles of Scilly Sustainability Awards in December 2024.





Grass Verges - Cormac for Cornwall Council are responsible for cutting many of the grass verges around the town. This year many areas were left during 'No Mow May' and since then just a metre along the edge has been cut to leave a sight line for drivers and the remainder of the grass left for insects and pollinators and to reduce traffic pollution as shown in this photo.

The initiative: 'Making Space for Nature in Cornish Towns' included planting wildflowers along sections of roadside verges to create corridors for pollinators. The area planted was left unmown through the winter and in many places the wildflowers seeded and flowered again this year. Interestingly, as the soil in the verges was left undisturbed there are less poppies but more white daisies to be seen.







Trees for Cornish Towns under Cornwall Council's Forest for Cornwall Project and with help from Councillor Sarah Thomson has identified streets and canvassed the residents about planting a broad selection of tree species on the verges. With 90 per cent support, planting of the trees began in March 2024 with further planting in autumn 2024 in Whitegate Road and St Aubyn Crescent. With few failures to date the project has been most successful. Sarah is also working to produce a **Newquay Tree Audit** and via media coverage encouraging the public to report trees in their area on the Trezilla App, an Open University project.



Sustainability

- Green waste from NIBP's regular weekly working parties is mostly collected by the Environment Team of NTC but some of the less tough material is composted in the dedicated compost bins Jenny and Mike Jelbert have set up for this at their allotment. The resultant excellent compost has then been made good use of to improve the soil for new planting in our project beds.
- The group regularly uses plants propagated from their own gardens in planting schemes and to raise money at plant sales. We have also removed and dried spent spring bulbs from our troughs to be planted out in the autumn.
- This year we have collected and used woodchip made available by Newquay Council to save waste, money and transport costs.

Community Participation – IT'S YOUR NEIGHBOURHOOD



1. Friends of Huer's Hut

The Huer's Hut is the oldest building in Newquay. Following restoration from a community driven campaign, the campaign chair, Jon Goodman is now the official custodian. Lighting, funded by the Lions organisation, can be used to floodlight the building to raise awareness of charities. In May 2025 it was floodlit in blue for Nerve Tumours UK.



2. Living Library Garden

This community space has been developing into an attractive community asset regularly enjoyed by all visiting the library. Upcycled planters have provided an excellent habitat for annuals, pollinator friendly species and edible plants. A bird table and bird bath have been added along with a willow tippee, picnic bench and direct access from the library. Children did the RSPB Big Bird Count and library groups use it all the time weather permitting.



3. Trenance Heritage Cottages

Set in Trenance Gardens, this row of Grade II listed, 17th century cottages are open to the public. The museum is run by volunteers who also organise various fundraising events such as the Summer Fair in June and Santa's Grotto at Christmas. The Function Room has become a popular wedding venue. The café is leased and runs as a separate business.



4. Pentire Esplanade Project

The Esplanade, East Pentire headland and the green at the south end of Fistral Beach have been registered as a Town and Village Green which protects them from development. Above Fistral Beach the green has been reseeded, paths installed and stone walls revealed.



5. Newquay Leisure Gardeners- Mount Wise Allotments Association

A friendly group supports members in the pursuit of gardening as a recreation and to promote health, education and community. Moreover there is the additional bonus of being outdoors and growing fresh vegetables for the table!

6. Newquay Old Cornwall Society Scrub Bashers This group actively protects local heritage sites by removing vegetation and keeping them clear of brambles etc thus ensuring they can safely be visited and are preserved for future generations.





7. Fistral Beach Clean

Established in 2010 this group meets on the last Saturday of each month to litter pick through the dunes, surrounding footpaths and beach, focusing on removing micro plastics from the strand line.



8. Creation Garden Children from the Bishops' C of E Learning Academy worked with staff from the Eden Project to design their own Creation Garden in the Early Years Space at the school. This has been funded by the PTA and staff and parents have been involved in the ongoing maintenance. Year 6 artists worked on the surfboard designs.

9. Crantock Street Community Garden


This neglected area is being transformed by local residents into a real community space incorporating planting and colourful murals. It is used for community events such as the Big Lunch in June and is a pleasant area to sit in. One raised bed contains an apple tree and herbs for residents to make use of.





10. Minor Volunteers

The group meets on Tuesday mornings and maintains various greenspaces around the village. These include the recreation ground, the churchyard and Porth Beach Promenade. The group also undertakes regular litter picks of the area. This year a major project has been restocking the bed by Beacon Vets shown here.





11. Newquay Junior Academy

A high achieving and well regarded school that encourages its pupils to go beyond their curriculum – helping out growing fruit and vegetables in the school kitchen garden teaches children about the environment, where food comes from and the importance of nature.

12. St Mawgan Churchyard Project

This project was undertaken to improve the biodiversity of the churchyard in line with recommendations of the 'Making Space for Nature' report written for the Church. A working party got together in September 2023 and regularly attracts 11 – 13 volunteers to work there. The Holy Well has been cleared and compost bins created. Bird boxes are going up and a plant list has drawn up. The result is a beautiful and carefully tended Church Garden and the tremendous annual Flower Festival in July.







13. St Columb Minor Micro-edible Gardens project

February 2024 saw the first micro-edible garden being placed and created at the top of Calshot Close in the village. Very much a joint effort being maintained by 'Grow-Your-Wellbeing' Services using a grant from CC John Fitter's Community Fund to cover the cost, NTC's donation of a large galvanized planter and the co-ordination of NTC Cllr Sarah Thomson. A further 2 planters have been placed in the centre of the village outside the Farmers Arms public house.

Fund Raising

- Newquay in Bloom receives regular support and financial funding to enter South West in Bloom from Newquay Town Council.
- We ran a plant stall at the Summer Fair in Trenance Gardens.
- At our Presentation Evening we held a raffle and offered home made cakes with the refreshments to raise funds.
- We received a donation for entering and winning a round in the 'Brains of Newquay Quiz' run by Newquay Lions.
- We received a donation from Pentire Residents' Association for the Mount Wise Roundabout following their AGM.
- Barbara Hannan, President and Tony Booth have undertaken gardening work in the community for which they have received donations.
